Biographical Sketch:

Bandy Lee, MD, MDiv, is a forensic psychiatrist, expert on violence, and Violence Prevention Alliance Academic Collaborators Project Group Leader for the World Health Organization (WHO). She is currently Co-Founder of the Violence Prevention Institute at Columbia University and President of the World Mental Health Coalition. She served as Director of Research for Harvard's Center for the Study of Violence, as well as co-founded Yale's Violence and Health Working Group at the MacMillan Center for International Studies. She has consulted with governments on prison reform and community violence prevention, such as for France, Ireland, Alabama, California, Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New York. She also played a key role in initiating reforms at Rikers Island, a correctional facility in New York City known for extreme levels of violence. She taught at Yale School of Medicine and Yale Law School for 17 years before joining the Harvard Program in Psychiatry and the Law. She authored the most comprehensive textbook on the subject to date: *Violence: An Interdisciplinary Approach to Causes, Consequences, and Cures* (Wiley-Blackwell, 2019). She published over 100 peer-reviewed articles and chapters, 17 edited scholarly books and journal special issues, and over 300 op-eds in outlets such as the *Guardian*, the *New York Times*, the *Boston Globe*, the *Independent*, and *Politico*. Apart from the WHO, she has consulted with the United Nations (helping to co-author former UN Secretary General Kofi Annan's chapter on "Violence Against Children"), UNESCO, and the World Economic Forum.
